



ASL 2022 Spring Survey Summary

- Who was surveyed?
- ASCCC Listservs used to distribute surveys
- American Sign Language (ASL) list exists with only 10 subscribers
- The goal was to reach faculty teaching courses in TOP Code 085000 (Sign Language) and TOP Code 085010 (Sign Language Interpreting).

Survey Respondents

- 57 total
 - 53 CCC faculty
 - 2 CSU faculty
 - 1 UC faculty
 - 1 other (CCC and CSU)
 - One CCC faculty was from another discipline.
- Corrected data
 - 55 CCC
 - 1 UC
- 29 different CCCs represented. Both of the CSU respondents identified a CCC that they were associated with. The UC respondent was from UCSD.

Have you used OER in lieu of a commercial text for any of the courses you teach?

- Yes 9, 16%
- No 47, 84%
- Have you ever considered using OER for one or more of your courses?
 - Yes 36%
 - No 17%
 - I don't know enough about OER to have seriously considered its use – 47%

For what course(s) were you considering OER and what resources, if any, did you find that might be useful?

- ASL 1/Beginning ASL 5
 - I did not find any developed by native signers and Deaf people. I did not find any that contained the rigor that the current published textbooks have.
 - Online ASL dictionary is available.
- Beyond ASL 1
 - I have done some OER searching... unfortunately, the ASL OERs currently available are not to our course expectations.
 - I use interactive online materials for ASL 1 AND 2 classes.
 - We don't have sufficient materials for ASL 1-4 for students and we need to do some more research in this area.
- Resource-related comments
 - Anything from Youtube that is related to Deaf culture and ASL. Also there are some websites that provide lesson in teaching ASL.

General OER Comments

- For target language and culture courses presently available resources do not reflect quality we are looking for.
- I always consider OER but have yet to find anything that is set up visually in ASL using videos and interactive materials.
- I would like to add additional resources and reducing costs for textbooks towards a ZTC course.
- Periodically, I have looked through OER and did not find any ASL resources that contained the rigor I want for my courses.
- There aren't many OER resources for ASL that would be Deaf-centric, culturally-appropriate, and equity-minded.

Ancillaries needed?

- ASL videos, worksheets, tests, etc.
- PowerPoint or other presentation materials and homework support.
 Ideally, these would be best if compatible with Canvas learning systems.
- Videos that feature ASL signs and conversations. Real life usage.
- We need more variety of ASL BIPOC and LGBTQIA Deaf signers.
- We need to have more videos in ASL by deaf signers from their textbooks that includes homework, exam, practices etc...

ASL in the CCCs

- Faculty from 29 different CCCs responded to the Spring 2022 survey.
- How many colleges have ASL programs?
- 44 CCCs have ASL programs.
- 21 have CTE programs, 34 have programs that are not CTE, 10 have both

Colleges with ASL Courses – But not Programs

- An additional 43 colleges have courses in TOP 0850 (non CTE).
- In other words, at least 87 CCCs have ASL courses.

Add filters

- Credit Degree Applicable > 913
- Program Applicable > 787
- You can explore filters or just download them all (Export to Excel)
- Sort by Status and remove "Inactive" ("Active" and "Approved" remain) > 430
- If your focus is specifically on courses with a particular unit value, you can sort by that
- Sort by title
- Deaf Culture

Colleges with a Deaf Culture course


- Keeping all titles that might be relevant being very generous 39 candidate courses
- Organized by college and then by title 27 courses

What's available?

- Commercial resources
- Free and not open
- Free and open
- What's wrong with free and not open?

Issues with available resources

- Free and not open can go away at any time you can't count on it being available.
- Free and open resources potentially not ready-to-use files in a Google drive, for example.
- YouTube ads.
- Resources that must be accessed online require Internet.
- Concerns about diversity and quality.

- <u>ASL University</u> Free, but not open
- <u>ASL Connect</u> (Gallaudet) –Not intended to support an entire course
 - ASL Connect aims to equip individuals to be lifelong learners through an equity-centered, immersive virtual learning environment from Deaf professionals with multicultural backgrounds, to transform the world for greater human CONNECTions.
 - ASL Connect welcomes people from diverse communities to CONNECT to the richness of American Sign Language and Deaf culture with the aspiration that they will be agents of change for equality and respect for the Deaf community.





 - JASLL is a website for scholarly works to be published in a video-based medium, using signed language as the primary language of the journal.
- <u>National Deaf Center on Postsecondary Outcomes</u> some resources openly licensed.
- <u>The Deaf Resource Library</u> An online collection of reference material and links intended to educate and inform people about Deaf cultures worldwide.




