

Zero Textbook Cost (ZTC) Acceleration Grant Collaboration Cohort Humanities Final Report

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INTRODUCTION

The Humanities Collaboration Cohort was among one of the first cohorts to conclude its work. As a discipline without Course Identification Numbering System (C-ID) descriptors or a Model Curriculum to establish course or pathway comparability, determinations of similarity at the course level were not easily made and there was no expectation of pathway alignment. Consequently, the initial data collection and analysis was complicated by the lack of a shared curricular structure.

COLLABORATION COHORT PURPOSE

The Academic Senate for California Community Colleges (ASCCC) Open Educational Resources Initiative (OERI) facilitated the work of the ZTC Acceleration Grant Humanities Collaboration Cohort. Although this process was introduced to prevent the duplication of effort, it also provides a means to ensure the awareness of available OER and other sustainable means of achieving ZTC status, share OER development plans, and identify opportunities for collaboration across colleges. At the conclusion of the cohort process, the OERI will provide a report to the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) that will document the work of the cohort, verify the absence of duplicative plans, and/or delineate how duplication will be prevented or minimized.

HUMANITIES COLLABORATION COHORT – MEMBER COLLEGES AND ZTC PATHWAYS

The Humanities Collaboration Cohort consisted of the following colleges working on the indicated pathway:

- Grossmont College Humanities and Fine Arts Associate of Arts (AA)
- Lake Tahoe Community College (LTCC) Liberal Arts AA
- Los Angeles City College (LACC) Performing and Visual Arts AA
- Lake Tahoe Community College (LTCC) Liberal Arts Arts and Humanities AA
- Modesto College Humanities AA
- Shasta College Humanities AA

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Cohort Participants and Data Collection

The following colleges participated in the Humanities Collaboration Cohort:

- Grossmont College Humanities and Fine Arts AA
- Los Angeles City College Performing and Visual Arts AA
- Lake Tahoe Community College Liberal Arts AA
- Modesto College Humanities AA
- Shasta College. Humanities AA

The ASCCC OERI collected course-level data for each of the pathways including current ZTC status, adopted resources, and plans to convert a course to ZTC to identify overlap and areas of potential collaboration. Since all colleges in the cohort were converting a local degree, courses were grouped by subject to identify commonalities. The grouping was as follows:

- Humanities and Religion
- English, ESL, and Other Languages
- Art, Music, and Performing Arts
- Other

Cohort Convening

The Humanities Collaboration Cohort convened synchronously via Zoom on April 24. The ASCCC OERI presented the group with the results of the data collection process and asked for clarity where data was missing. In addition, the ASCCC OERI presented available OER for the cohort's consideration.

Findings

Alignment between the degree pathways was limited. While the ASCCC OERI was able to identify broad categories of potential alignment, the courses within each category were distinct and any proposed creation was targeted at the college's unique population. In addition, the courses in the pathways that are the focus of this cohort appear to commonly achieve ZTC by mechanisms other than OER, including the purchase of texts, using no text, and relying on freely available resources.

The ASCCC OERI recommends that the cohort participants share any resources that they are using to begin their efforts along with any frameworks for new OER creation that might be useful to other participants. There is no evidence for duplication of efforts amongst the proposed plans and no similarity between projects to warrant collaboration.
