INTRODUCTION

The Political Science Collaboration Cohort consisted of ten colleges. Discipline faculty have already engaged in collaborative OER development funded by the OERI and only one of its seven C-ID descriptors presently is associated with no available OER. The Cohort benefitted from the participation of both the current Political Science Discipline Lead and two of the former Leads when it has its initial convening on March 19, 2024. Even before the Cohort was convened, discipline faculty were discussing how they might work together to move the discipline's ZTC work forward.

The Political Science Collaboration Cohort has identified collaborative projects for C-ID POLS 110, C-ID POLS 120, C-ID POLS 130, C-ID POLS 140, C-ID POLS 160, and C-ID POLS 170. C-ID POLS 170 (Introduction to the Politics of Race and Gender) is, currently, the one course for which no OER have been identified. All cohort participants have access to the collaborative plans to ensure they can consider adopting the products upon completion. Planned collaborations include updates of existing texts, the development of ancillaries, and remixes. A description of each collaborative project is available in Appendix 5.

In addition to creating and improving resources for teaching the various political science courses that have C-ID descriptors, there is grant-work planned to create OER for a course titled "Introduction to American Political Economy." Learn more about the proposed development of a descriptor for this course on the <u>CalPoliSci website</u>.

COLLABORATION COHORT PURPOSE

The Academic Senate for California Community Colleges (ASCCC) Open Educational Resources Initiative (OERI) facilitated the work of the ZTC Acceleration Grant Political Science Collaboration Cohort. Although this process was introduced to prevent the duplication of effort, it also provides a means to ensure the awareness of available OER and other sustainable means of achieving ZTC status, share OER development plans, and identify opportunities for collaboration across colleges. At the conclusion of the cohort process, the OERI will provide a report to the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) that will document the work of the cohort, verify the absence of duplicative plans, and/or delineate how duplication will be prevented or minimized.

POLITICAL SCIENCE COLLABORATION COHORT FOCUS, PLANNED COLLABORATIONS, ANCILLARY DEVELOPMENT, AND ADAPTATIONS

The cohort primarily focused on conversion of courses aligned with a Political Science C-ID descriptor. However, several colleges indicated intentions to convert local courses or courses without a C-ID designation. The only potential duplication that was not resolved involved C-ID Law, Public Policy, and Society (LPPS) 110. DVC, Palomar, and SD Mesa intend to convert this course to ZTC. Additional conversation between DVC, Palomar College, and SD Mesa is needed to confirm non-duplication. Unfortunately, Palomar's only participation was the provision of course information in advance of the initial meeting of the cohort. A list of unique local courses that Cohort colleges intend to work on is provided in the next section.

CONCLUSIONS

The Political Science Collaboration Cohort had a productive initial 1st meeting that was followed by additional smaller meetings to discuss collaborative resource development. The OERI will continue to work with cohort members to share the various OER presently being developed.

As noted previously, Palomar was not an active cohort participant. In addition, Diablo Valley College was not able to provide fully developed action plans for the courses in their pathway, but their discipline faculty did participate in the cohort discussions and will refer to the work of the cohort as they determine their next steps.

- Victor Valley College (VVC) Political Science ADT

The ASCCC OERI collected course level data for each of the pathways including current Zero Textbook Cost (ZTC) status, adopted resources, and plans to convert a course to ZTC to identify overlap and areas of potential collaboration. Since all colleges are converting the Political Science ADT, the courses were grouped using the Political Science Transfer Model Curriculum (TMC) to identify commonalities.

Cohort Convening

The Political Science Collaboration Cohort convened synchronously via Zoom on March 21. The ASCCC OERI presented the group with the results of the data collection process and asked for clarity where data were missing. In addition, the ASCCC OERI presented available OER for the cohort's consideration.

The cohort primarily focused on conversion of courses aligned with a POLS C-ID descriptor. However, several colleges indicated intentions to convert local courses or courses outside of the POLS descriptors. DVC, Palomar College, and SD Mesa intend to convert C-ID LPPS 110 to ZTC. Additional conversation between DVC, Palomar College, and SD Mesa is needed to confirm non-duplication. Palomar's only participation was the provision of course information in advance of the initial meeting of the cohort. The remaining courses are local courses which require unique approaches. The ASCCC OERI recommends that the cohort participants continue to share project progress with the cohort members.
